Tribal Ordinance No. 2002-0002.

"All adult enrolled members shall renew his or her enrollment once every seven (7) years (inside territory) or every five (5) years (outside territory)"

OR

"A member shall be ineligible to vote in tribal elections or receive Tribal Services..."

Henry Ward Oxendine Sworn In As Tribal Judge

Pembroke—February 21, 2006—Henry Ward Oxendine was sworn in as the 8th Judge of the Supreme Court of the Lumbee Tribe. The ceremony took place at the Pembroke Court. Robeson County District Court Judge Stanley Carmichael administered the oath of office.

Judge Oxendine steered the Lumbee Supreme Court along a path of responsibility and unity while serving as Chief Judge of the restructured Lumbee tribal government. In accordance with the precedence set by the Lumbee Tribal Council, Judge Oxendine returns to the Supreme Court following a 2 year expiration term.

"His keen intellect and sound judgment command the respect of his colleagues," stated Chief Judge Tony Hunt.
